
We are a sustainably managed commercial operation cultivating plantation and native Santalum spicatum to produce timber and high-quality sandalwood oil We have institutional, high net worth & family office investors We have 15,000 hectares (40,000 acres) under management We are harvesting > 1000 tonnes of plantation sandalwood per year We have 25 - 30 years of sandalwood supply





What is West Australian Sandalwood?

- **Botanical Identity**: Santalum spicatum. Renowned for its aromatic heartwood and essential oil production.
- **Cultural and Historical Significance**: Valued for thousands of years by Aboriginals for its medicinal properties and ceremonial uses. Sacred to Hindu's and central to Buddhists for incense.
- **Environmental Role**: A unique ecological role in maintaining biodiversity and soil health in arid landscapes.

Sandalwood Plantations:

- Help reduce soil salinity
- Increase site biodiversity (native vegetation are not cleared)
- Provide habitat for native wildlife
- Carbon sequestration



Dutjahn won the UN Equator Prize for this regenerative approach that supports people and biodiversity to thrive, addressing UNSDGs:










Wild Sandalwood Area










History of Sandalwood



Western Australia was founded in 1829. 16 years later, in 1845, the first exports of sandalwood were shipped to Asia.





Peak Supply 14,000 tonnes per year

WA has a long history of sandalwood harvesting and overproduction



Overharvesting and habitat loss have threatened natural populations, leading to conservation efforts and the development of sustainable plantation sandalwood farming in WA.

Sustainable Plantations

Conservation of Wild Resources: Reduces pressure on native sandalwood populations, aiding in the preservation of biodiversity and preventing overharvesting in natural habitats.



Sustainable Supply: Ensures a steady and ethical supply of sandalwood and its by-products to meet growing global demand without depleting native forests.



Environmental Benefits: Contributes to soil health, carbon sequestration, and ecosystem restoration, particularly in degraded or arid lands.



Economic and Social Impact: Creates jobs, supports regional economies, and fosters partnerships with Indigenous communities for sustainable land management and cultural preservation

Uses and Markets





- Used in body moisturisers, face cream, sun screen, anti-aging, skin cleansers & soaps
- Increasing concern with toxicity in cosmetics driving strong demand for natural ingredients
- Therapeutic application has ancient roots; key in Ayurveda medicine

Pharmaceutical - Wood Oils & Nut Oils

- Unique anti-inflammatory, anti-spasmodic, antibacterial and healing properties under study
- Product development focusing on acne, blood pressure, fungal infections & cancers

500,000 tpa of wood used for incense production of which 0.4% is sandalwood
Over 1 billion sticks burnt per day in Asia. One of the strongest growing markets for Western Australian sandalwood

 One of the strongest growing markets for Western Australian sandalwood

 Incorporation of Western Australian sandalwood is now readily accepted as a replacement to Indian sandalwood

Annual global perfume industry sales: US\$39bn
3.8% pa growth 2005-2010


 A reliable and consistent quality of supply will assist in the growth of this market




Plantation Sandalwood Markets
